

As Director of *It's a Wonderful Life*, I can tell you that for me, it was a wonderful experience! The cast and crew were exceptionally talented and committed to working together to deliver a show of which we could be proud. I have seldom seen a more supportive and responsive group. I have to thank all of them for their efforts, which brought a new dimension to the Orange Players. It was a piece that demanded much of all actors, who each played several varied roles and worked hard to develop individual characterizations for each. They were also invaluable, along with the production screw, in locating objects for the non-recorded sound effects (in keeping with the period) that were all produced live by Lanette Errante, with the assistance of the actors, in full view of the audience.

The cast included new Orange Players and veteran Orange Players. Marianne Miller, OP Co-President, added much to the varied roles she played by also being the songbird of the commercials done during the play. Bruce Spiewack played the leading role of George Bailey with an astonishing range of emotions. He and his family have been with us for several years. (He even brought his own stage makeup, bought for the OP revival of Fiddler on the Roof). Bill Taylor, our supervising angel Joseph, has directed several shows and programs for OP and appeared in Spoon River Anthology, The Man Who Came to Dinner, Fiddler, and Mame, among others. Kate Rakowski, a recent graduate of Northeastern University with a degree in theatre, played Mary, George's girl friend and eventual wife, showing considerable range as an actress. John Cloud played our audience-appealing angel Clarence (who eventually earned his wings), as well as the emcee of the radio show who sang parts of the commercials. John is a veteran actor and has countless TV commercials to his credit. Bonnie Coppola is a retired French and Spanish Language teacher from the Orange School System, whose last stage appearance was thirty years ago in a PTA show! She shouldn't have stayed away so long -her characterizations were right on! David Gregory, our malicious Mr. Potter (whom we disliked as a character, but loved as an actor and a person!), was a professional stage manager for many years

Betty Mc Cready, who played many diverse parts, is one of the most versatile actresses with whom I have worked, and just wound up a run of A.R.Gurney's *Indian Blood* at Stratford's Theater One. Rob Palermo, new to our group, played our bumbling Uncle Billy so well and was truly one of the best cheerleaders for the play, always coming up with ideas for promotion, ticket sales, etc. And Sergio Rodriguez—a New Haven Alderman and activist for children, civil rights and job placements, skillfully played many parts utilizing several different accents and also managed to be a most valued morale builder for the cast and crew. Lanette Errante, with the assistance of the cast, produced and skillfully managed the multitude of sound effects that were such an important part of the show.

There were other people besides the cast who made this show happen. Producer Andrea Shiffrin made and answered many phone calls and saw to many details, starting before casting and ending after performance. Patt Brotschul was Stage Manager, one of the most efficient and professional with whom I have worked. In IAWL, there were 101 sound cues, 46 light cues and 27 music cues — all of which had to be coordinated and integrated into the performance, which she did admirably.

Our Set Designer/Technical Director was John Miller. He and I spent many hours outside of rehearsals discussing details of set design, construction and lighting, which then came to fruition through his efforts. Thanks to the connection with Hunter Spence and the Yale Drama School, we were able to obtain a wind machine, operated in performance by David Gregory, which was crucial in establishing atmosphere. The minimalist set was well done - and it came in under budget! John also hung lights with Dave Spence and ran lights for the show. Mike Brotschul, our talented Scenic Artist, painted the incredibly detailed city scene that backed the flown window on the set. To Robin Lewis, our Accompanist and Music Director, we all owe tremendous gratitude. During the final week of rehearsals, she had to cope with an enormous personal tragedy, which she kept from the cast until the last performance, and continued to fulfill her role flawlessly! She is a lady of strength and commitment - I am proud to be associated with her.

I am also grateful to Bob Rich and Robin Lewis for doing Tickets, Sandy Kline for taking cast pictures, Karen Lynn of Hair Loft for doing period hairstyles for our actresses, and Rich and Colin Moran for their help in setting up on Friday. More good news — we made a nice profit!
